Understanding the Mexican Revolution
To address this period in Mexican history, first we have to talk about life in early 20th century Mexico.
It is true that after three decades in power, Porfirio Díaz Mexican during that time- brought several positive changes for the country; mainly in its infrastructure, technology and transportation. His motto: "Peace, order and progress" highlights this fact. However, not everybody in Mexico felt progress was being made, since wealth and progress didn't reach all of Mexicans.
This, plus the fact of being so long in power, made Francisco I. Madero to found the Partido Nacional Anti rreeleccionista (National Anti-reelection Party); under the slogan: "Sufragio efectivo no reelección" (Effective vote, no reelection). That was the beginning -on November 20th, 1910- of the national rebellion that became the Mexican Revolution.
During this period, many national and folkloric heroes arose, such as Doroteo Arango (better known as Pancho Villa) and Emiliano Zapata; iconic character in the struggle for better conditions for Mexican farmers. Álvaro Obregón and Venustiano Carranza who would later become presidents; also joined in.
The period ends formally on February 5th, 1917; when a new Constitution is enacted. This Constitution is still in place and it establishes equality for all Mexicans and forbids Presidential reelection.
In Mexico City, there is a parade through the streets of Downtown, to honor national sportsmen and government workers alike. It is a bank holiday, so don't rule out a short holiday trip to other places in our country.
